Deadline Approaching for List of Pro Bono Legal Service Providers Providers Must Reapply by November 30, 2016

FALLS CHURCH, Va. – The Executive Office for Immigration Review reminds the community of pro bono legal service providers of the November 30, 2016, deadline to reapply for inclusion on the List of Pro Bono Legal Service Providers. EOIR automatically transferred all organizations that were on the former “List of Free Legal Services Providers” to the new “List of Pro Bono Legal Service Providers” (List) when the new rule took effect in November 2015. Under the rule, each of those organizations that wishes to remain on the List is required to submit a new application by the established deadline. Any organization that has not applied under the new rule by the deadline will be removed from the List beginning with the January 2017 publication.

The agency also welcomes new applications for inclusion on the List. We encourage all non-profit organizations, referral services, and private attorneys who are interested in applying to visit the [Pro Bono List web page](#), which includes links to the application form, instructions, and frequently asked questions about the List and the application process.

The Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) is an agency within the Department of Justice. Under delegated authority from the Attorney General, immigration judges and the Board of Immigration Appeals interpret and adjudicate immigration cases according to United States immigration laws. EOIR's immigration judges conduct administrative court proceedings in immigration courts located throughout the nation. They determine whether foreign-born individuals – whom the Department of Homeland Security charges with violating immigration law – should be ordered removed from the United States or should be granted relief from removal and be permitted to remain in this country. The Board of Immigration Appeals primarily reviews appeals of decisions by immigration judges. EOIR's Office of the Chief Administrative Hearing Officer adjudicates immigration-related employment cases. EOIR is committed to ensuring fairness in all of the cases it adjudicates.
